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Mit'totiliztli – traditions of the ancestors



Nahui Ollin : The Four Movements; Earth Elements

- Every dance ceremony begins with the Nahui Ollin, the four movements, acknowledging the four directions.
- The four sacred elements: water, fire, wind, and earth are also acknowledged during the Nahui Ollin

Danzante Costumes: Symbols of Warriors

 Danzantes represent Mexica warriors, therefore their costumes symbolize either jaguars or eagles, the two military groups that existed among the Aztecs.

Instruments: Huehuetl, Ayoyotes, Sonajas, Conchas

- In Aztec Dance, instruments play an important role, they make the sounds and music that accompany the sacred movements/prayers for the gods.
- Huehuetl- Drum: Although the huehuetl was used for military purposes, in danza, it is used to make the sounds that danzantes use to mark their steps. Within the danza circle, the huehuetl represents our abuelos, the sun and the sound is the voice of our mother earth, *Tonantzin*.
- Ayoyotes and sonajas: Both made from the Chachayotl tree seeds, it is typically said to sound like the rain and rattle snakes. In danza, they are used to sound out the rhythm of a specific song. For a danzante, the ayoyotes, represent a new journey in their life as a danzante.

 Concha: Quiquiztli or shell trumpets are wind instruments. In danza, it is used to announce the dancers that danza is about to begin. It is also a representation of the element of the wind, during the Nahui Ollin.
